HOW CLIMATE CHANGE THREATENS AFRICA'S FOOD SECURITY

Changing weather patterns or extreme events, such as floods or drought, can have negative consequences for agricultural production. As a result, people will have less access to food, which forces them to buy food products. This affects their financial situation and their wellbeing. It also influences their health as people will most likely buy cheaper food products that are less nutritious. They can, then, become chronically ill as a result of unhealthy food.

Increasing temperatures, the change in precipitation and frequency of extreme weather spells also threaten Africa's food production systems. Changes in precipitation are not merely about increasing or decreasing rainfall. But rainy seasons that begin later or earlier than normal or sudden rain spells hitting a region when it is supposed to be dry, have a greater impact on crops failing than a weather season that starts on time.

Another serious situation is when farming land is lost. This happens as a result of declining groundwater levels and rising sea levels. It can lead to dryness of the soil or increasing levels of salt. It reduces the suitability of land for cultivation of crops. Another consequence of climate change that affects food security is the increasing frequency of extreme weather events such as floods, droughts, hail and heat waves. These can be fatal to crops. Apart from damaging crops it can also damage infrastructure like roads, houses etc. This may prevent people from getting their crops to the market.

Climate change also leads to pest outbreaks that further weaken the food systems. The fishing industry is also being threatened. Fish stocks in large lakes throughout Africa are declining — not only because of overfishing, but because of declining water levels due to evaporation as a result of rising temperatures.
