TEXT A

FAST FASHION'S FOOTPRINT

- 1 Fast fashion refers to the quick and inexpensive production of clothing by mass-market retailers in response to the latest fashion trends. The fashion industry is vibrant and varied. It has grown significantly in recent years due to the popularity of fast fashion. The goal is to get new clothing styles from the runway¹ to the store as quickly and cheaply as possible to meet consumer demand for trendy and affordable clothing. 5
- 2 'Clothing overconsumption is on the rise in Africa, including South Africa, and a major reason for this is the acceleration of the fast fashion cycle,' says Dr Lorna Christie, researcher at the Department of Life Sciences, College of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences (CAES). South Africa is a fashion-conscious nation and it shows in consumers' spending habits. In one financial year, South Africans spent R180 billion on clothing and textiles, which amounts to 18% of all retail sales in that year. As a strong consumer base, South Africa is contributing to pollution because of the massive amounts of waste the clothing industry generates. 10 15
- 3 Globally, fashion companies have drastically changed their release of new clothing collections. In the past, only two collections per year were available. Currently, some brands and fashion houses release two collections a month, or even more. This is also a growing trend in South Africa.
- 4 With fashion changing so often and so fast, it is not surprising that people are buying more clothing. Globally, clothing production has almost doubled since the year 2000. People are buying more garments than in the past, and they only keep the clothes for half as long. The fast fashion cycle is increasing even more, and people are purchasing clothing at an even faster rate. They discard clothing at a faster rate too. 20 25
- 5 The amount of clothing that gets thrown away every second of every day is equivalent to a truck filled with garbage. Discarded clothing contributes massively to pollution. The chemicals used in the manufacturing process are released, and because of all the synthetic fibres, clothes either decompose slowly or do not decompose at all. 30
- 6 Natural fibres are not any better, because the cultivation of cotton and other natural fibres requires the use of water, fertilisers, pesticides, as well as the energy for picking the fibre and processing it into yarns². Then, there is the dyeing process, which requires large amounts of water and chemicals, and the runoff³ from this process can pollute waterways⁴ and harm the environment. 35

- 7 Washing clothes releases 500 000 tons of microfibres into the ocean each year, which is the equivalent of 50 billion plastic bottles. More than 10 000 litres of water is used when manufacturing a single pair of jeans. This is equivalent to the average drinking water for one person for five-and-a-half years. There is a further impact on the environment when garments are shipped and delivered to the point of sale as much fuel and power are used. 40
- 8 The fashion industry has a damaging effect on the environment, but everyone has the power to drive the change that will reduce the impact. Fashion designers must use eco-friendly, long-lasting materials when manufacturing clothes. This will lead to sustainable fashion which encourages the repair, recycling and donation of clothes. Discarding clothes in a rubbish dump must only be done as a last option. 45
- 9 Consumers must buy from sustainable⁵ fashion brands which do not produce clothes for the fast fashion market. They must support small local businesses which do not contribute to pollution. Instead of buying an outfit that is going to be worn once, it is better if consumers rent such outfits. People must ensure that their desire to look good does not have a negative impact on the environment. 50

3. Candidates' responses should be assessed as objectively as possible.

MARKING THE COMPREHENSION

- Because the focus is on understanding, incorrect spelling and language errors in responses should not be penalised unless such errors change the meaning/understanding. (Errors must still be indicated.)
- If a candidate uses words from a language other than the one being examined, disregard those words, and if the answer still makes sense, do not penalise. However, if a word from another language is used in a text and required in an answer, this will be acceptable.
- For **open-ended questions**, no marks should be awarded for YES/NO or I AGREE/I DISAGREE. The reason/substantiation/motivation is what should be considered.
