PRINCIPLES FOR MARKING GEOGRAPHY – JUNE 2026

The following marking principles are developed to standardise marking processes.

MARKING

- ALL answers MUST be marked, irrespective of whether they are correct or incorrect.
- Where the maximum marks have been allocated for a particular question, place an **M** over the remainder of the text to indicate the maximum marks have been achieved.
- A clear, neat tick must be used: ✓
 - If ONE mark is allocated, ONE tick must be used: ✓
 - If TWO marks are allocated, TWO ticks must be used: ✓✓
 - The tick must be placed at the FACT that a mark is being allocated for.
 - Ticks must be kept SMALL, as various layers of moderation may take place.
- Incorrect answers must be marked with a clear, neat cross: **X**
 - Use MORE than one cross across a paragraph/discussion style questions to indicate that all facts have been considered.
 - Do NOT draw a line through an incorrect answer.
 - Do NOT underline the incorrect facts.

NOTE THE FOLLOWING

- If the numbering is incorrect or left out, as long as the sequence of answers to questions is followed candidates can be credited.
- Spelling errors if recognisable, award the marks provided the meaning is correct.
- Be sensitive to the sense of an answer, which may be stated in a different way.
- In questions where a letter is the accepted response, but the learner writes the actual answer- award marks.

TOTALLING AND TRANSFERRING OF MARKS

- Each subquestion must be totalled.
 - Questions in Section A has five sub-sections, therefore five subtotals per question is required. Section B has three sub-sections and three subtotals.
 - Sub-section totals to be written in the right-hand margin at the end of the subsection and underlined.
 - Subtotals must be written legibly.
 - Leave space to write in moderated marks of different levels.
- Total subtotals and transfer totals to top left-hand margin next to question number
- Transfer total to cover of answer book.

MODERATION

Marking on each level of moderation is done in the same way as the initial marking. All guidelines for marking must be adhered to.

If a mark for a subquestion is changed after moderation, the moderator must strike through the marker's mark and write down the new mark, 42 16.

The total for the question must be recalculated, and similarly be struck off and the new total to be written down, 26- 36.

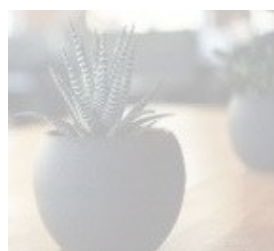

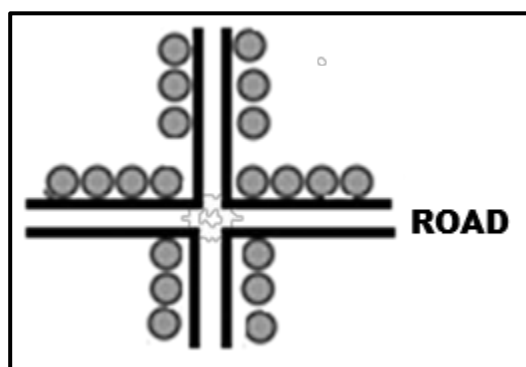

KEY PROBLEMS CAUSED BY RURAL DEPOPULATION

The standard of living in rural areas is declining. Businesses close and services become scarce, which forces people to leave rural regions.

It is also not uncommon for residents to complain about the lack of services, medical assistance and even bank branches. All this impoverishes (makes poorer) these municipalities and their residents.

Environmental repercussions occur when farmers, who have traditionally taken care of the countryside, no longer provide upkeep after they abandon their farms. This leads to the growth of bushes and vegetation, increasing the intensity of unexpected fires.

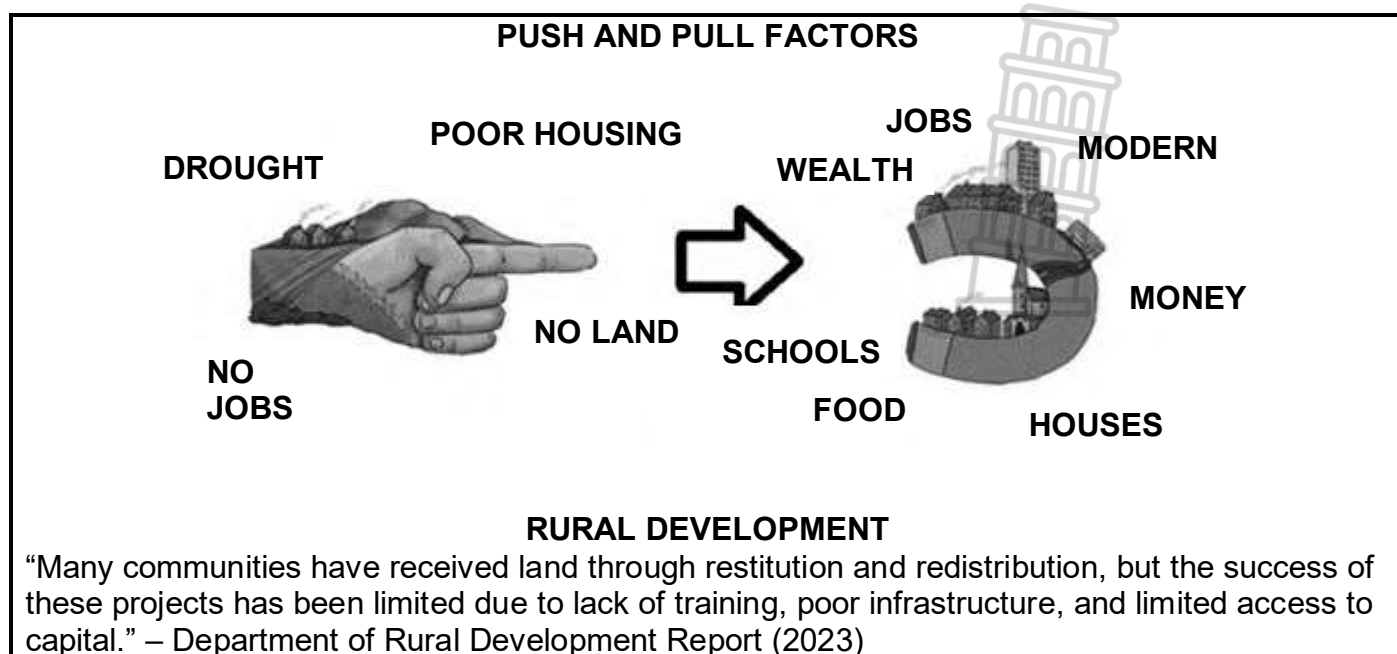

For many in rural South Africa, accessing healthcare is fraught with challenges. Clinics are often located hours away, requiring expensive or exhausting trips that many cannot afford. Even when patients do reach a clinic, they may be confronted with overburdened staff, long queues, and a rushed, impersonal experience.

This situation is particularly complex (difficult) in poor communities. Decades of systemic inequalities mean that many people are reluctant to question or approach healthcare providers in positions of authority.

This can lead to delayed care, incomplete health history and poor adherence to treatment plans – factors that can severely impact health.

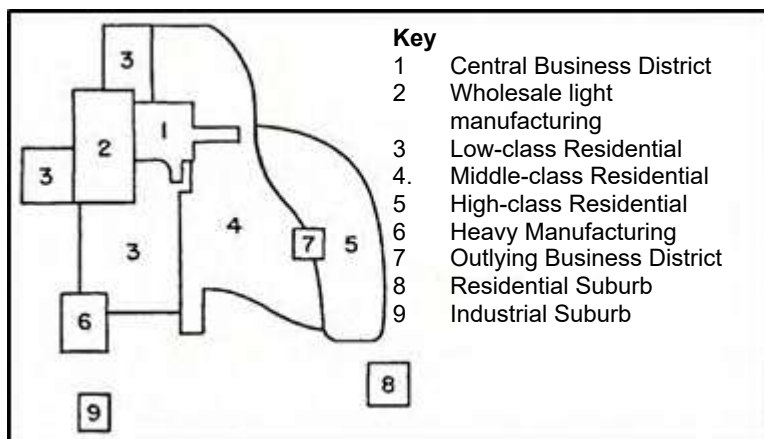

INSIDE JOHANNESBURG'S URBAN CRISIS: FROM ECONOMIC HUB TO CITY IN DECAY

By the time the Group Areas Act and influx control were completely abolished, hundreds of thousands of people migrated to the cities, resulting in rapid urbanisation which led to urban blight as experienced in most South African cities. With rapid urbanisation came overcrowding. Additionally, urbanisation can indirectly affect society by contributing to health problems due to pollution and food shortages. Hillbrow, a part of Johannesburg's Central Business District (CBD), has experienced significant urban decay, marked by crumbling infrastructure and high crime rates. Once a vibrant and glamorous area, it has become synonymous with poverty, grime, and a sense of chaos.

East London (eMonti) is a coastal city in the Eastern Cape, located between the Buffalo and Nahoon Rivers along the Indian Ocean. The city features wide streets, a subtropical climate, and is a hub for fishing, manufacturing, and transport, connecting to the Free State via rail.

The coastal Eastern Cape region can probably lay claim to being the birthplace of motorsport in South Africa and the first home of the Formula One Grand Prix (motor racing).

Water sports, dolphin watching, hiking, and cycling are popular activities. Nearby game reserves offer wildlife experiences, and attractions like the East London Museum and Aquarium which provide educational value. It's natural beauty, historic port, and tourism offerings make East London a key economic and recreational centre in South Africa's southeast.

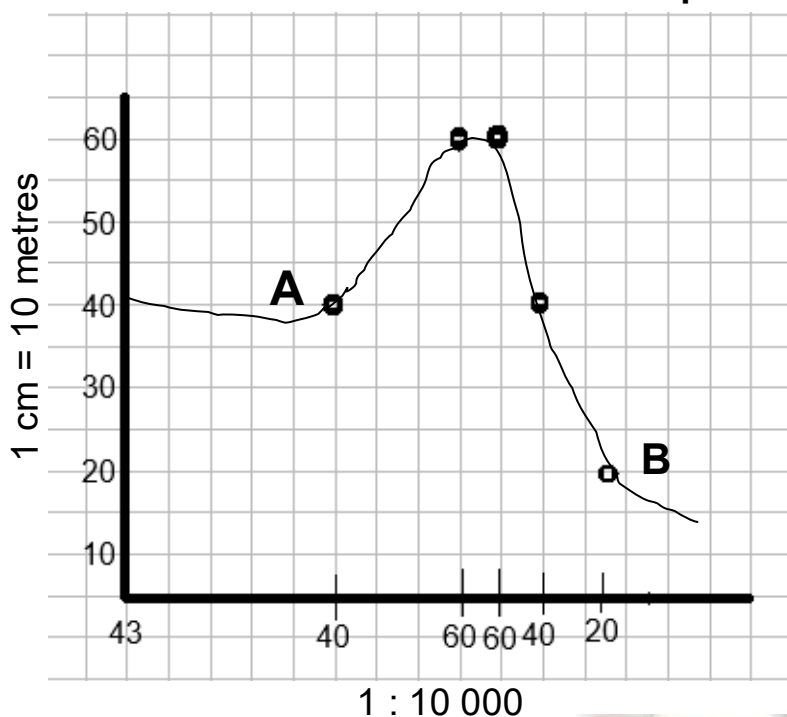
